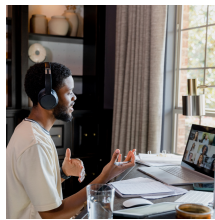

Learning More About Canvas: How do I Export the Gradebook for a Backup?

Have you ever wondered what would happen if you lost or accidentally overwrote grades in your gradebook? While it is extremely rare for Canvas to lose information in your course, there is always the element of human error that can cause issues.



Backing up grades after midterms and finals is an effective way to make sure that you have a reliable record for safekeeping. Exporting and Importing grades is very easy. Give it a try!

- The gradebook can be exported to a CSV file anytime and saved on your computer.
- Once exported, it can be imported back into the gradebook if necessary.
- Exported gradebooks at the end of a semester can be a quick reference without reopening your Canvas course in the case of reference or grade challenges.
