

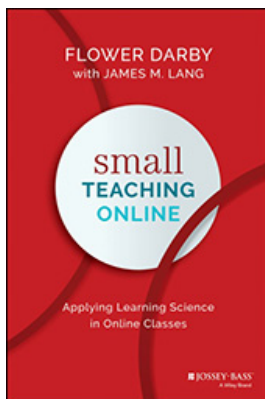

Live-Streaming from the Classroom

With the installation of Huddle / Avaya and Owl cameras in general usage classrooms across campus, it is possible to livestream classroom instruction. This will help in densifying classrooms and provide a means for students to keep up with their studies they are not able to attend in person.

There are two supported live-streaming technologies on campus, *Microsoft Teams*, which is part of Office 365 suite, and *Conferences* in Canvas. The exact process for live-streaming from the classroom will depend on which streaming technology (Teams or Conferences) an instructor chooses and which type of camera (Huddle / Avaya or Owl) is in the classroom. The videos below walk through how to live-stream using each possible combination.

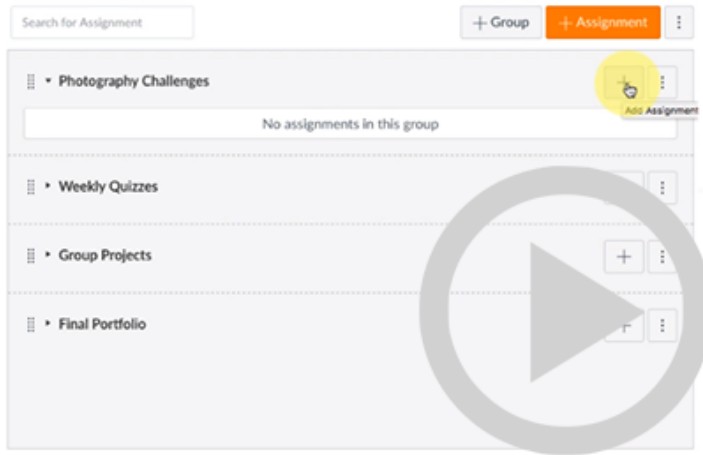

When utilizing many versions of a similar assignment (i.e. Week 1 Homework, Week 2 Homework, etc.) instructors can construct a single assignment and use that as the template for additional assignments. An assignment can be duplicated, and its parameters edited, to allow for the easy creation of many similar assignments.

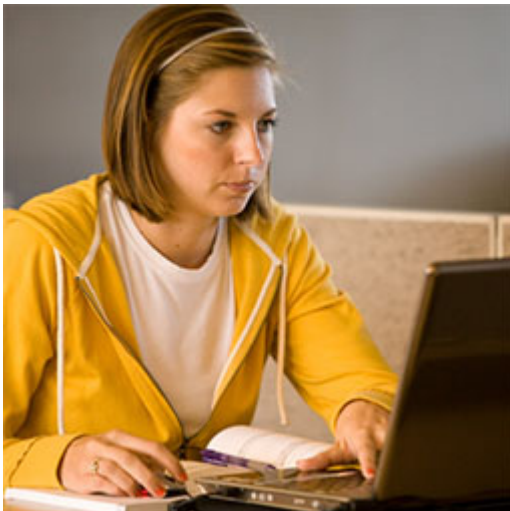

Engage Your Students using a Response System System

iClicker has been adopted as the campus-wide student response system. Students can use iClicker through an app on their Smart phone/tablet or by purchasing a remote device. Whether students are in the same classroom or in another location, faculty can use iClicker app to take attendance, check student comprehension and engagement during instruction, and assess learning through adhoc or scheduled short quizzes.
