TEACHING AND LEARNING DURING A PANDEMIC

Teaching and learning during a pandemic has brought an extra set of challenges. Planning for several modes of course delivery and making human connections with our students has been especially difficult. The typical mid-semester slump—when both professors and students often struggle with all that needs to be accomplished—feels particularly challenging in 2020.

Supporting students' learning has been and should continue to be our primary goal in the classroom. Below are some strategies that can help you make important connections with students while supporting their learning during this unprecedented time.

- Communicate with students. Let students know that you care about their success. An encouraging word from a professor in an email, text, or phone call can do much to motivate a student who may be struggling, as well as boost the energy of those who appear to be doing well. Communicate deadlines early and keep to the schedule to help students stay informed and on track. Posting frequent text or video announcements in Canvas can also send the message that "we're in this together."
- Nudge students in need of extra support. The "Message students who..." feature
 in the Canvas gradebook allows you to send individual emails to students who have
 not submitted an assignment or to students who scored less than a certain
 percentage. In a matter of moments, you can email encouraging words or helpful
 advice to students who may be struggling.
- Collect student feedback to gauge course climate. Asking the following three
 questions can help you gauge students' feelings regarding learning in your course.
 These questions communicate that you want to know how things are going and care
 about student success.
 - What else is important for your instructor to know?
 - What could your instructor do to better facilitate your understanding of the content in this course?
 - What is working well for you in terms of your learning in this course?

Examine Your Assumptions. The assumptions we make about students influence
the ways in which we interact with them, which in turn impacts their learning.
 Remember that our students are human beings who are feeling the stresses of life
just as we are. Many of them are worried about their grades, their health, or the
health of loved ones. 2020 has brought life-altering changes to many of them. It
might serve us well to assume that everyone is doing the best they can right now.

We will never be sorry that we taught with empathy during this time, offering grace to both ourselves and our students. Especially during this uncertain time, remember that the best college teachers convey fairness, compassion, and concern (Bain, 2004).


