

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1. ITLE TEACHING AND LEARNING NEW TWITTER ACCOUNT

ITLE's Teaching and Learning Support department has created the new @OSU_ITLE_TEACH Twitter account to spread useful information and insights into course design, syllabus development, educational technology, and many other aspects of teaching and learning.



2. USING ZOOM WITH CANVAS

Zoom in Canvas offers multiple choices when it comes to managing Zoom in your classroom. Please note that based on your affiliations within your college and previous zoom accounts you may need to use the University provided Zoom-OSU-STW link or your college specific Zoom-College link. Over time IT plans to merge these into only one choice but for now some courses will have two options.



If you are trying to access either of these links for the first time, please keep the following in mind.

- If this is your first time using Zoom, first login with your OKEY credentials at https://okstate-edu.zoom.us/ to create your account, signing in with the SSO button at the bottom of the Sign-In box after clicking Sign-in.
- Inside your course, please confirm which Zoom link works for you. After this is determined you can hide the additional link on the Navigation tab of your Course settings to help avoid confusion.
- Two of the main troubleshooting tips we have seen resolve issues so far are to clear your browser cache and confirm any issues you find persist between Chrome, Firefox and (Mac only) Safari.



7. COMMON CANVAS QUESTIONS

Below is a list of five useful tutorial videos answering five commonly asked questions about Canvas.



How Do I Import Materials from Past Versions of a Course?

Watch the Video

Content can be imported into a Canvas directly from other Canvas courses, which is very useful when re-using content from one semester to another. The same process can be used when copying content from a Sandbox or Test environment into an actual course.

How Do I Add a TA to the Course?

Watch the Video

Instructors can use the People option in a course navigation bar to add a TA to a class.

How Do I Get a List of Student Email Addresses?

Watch the Video

Canvas lets instructors use the New Analytics tool to get a .CSV file which contains student emails as well as a list of students sortable by Last Name.

How Do I Add a Custom Dashboard Image?

Watch the Video

Canvas lets instructors customize the dashboard images of courses by using header images. These can be a useful way of distinguishing courses from each other and providing visual cues as to the type of content contained within a course.

How Can I See What My Students See?

Watch the Video

Student view can be used as a way for instructors to peek at their courses through the eyes of a student, which can help pin down problems that students are reporting. This video uses the example of two discussion board threads that are missing for students, with the instructor using student view to get to the bottom of the issue.

8. COMBINE COURSE SECTIONS IN CANVAS

Course sections within Canvas for Summer & Fall 2021 can be combined upon request. To request a combination of two or more course sections, email canvas@okstate.edu with the names of the courses as they currently appear in Canvas including the five-digit CRN code.

Example:

Please combine the courses below.

ABCD-1234-12345 ABCD-1234-12346

Please be aware that only the materials, submissions, etc. from one section can be preserved during the combining process. Because of this, it is not recommended to combine sections once a semester has begun.

9. ONLINE AND HYBRID TEACHING RESOURCES

Teaching online or HyFlex, when thoughtfully planned, can be very engaging and effective across subjects and disciplines. Whether the content is taught synchronously (live) or asynchronously (on your own time), faculty members can present information to students, demonstrate processes, facilitate large or small group discussions, assess student learning and provide feedback on assignments and assessments. ITLE has resources to assist you in your planning for a short-term shift or a semester-long course.
