3. MANAGING GRADES IN CANVAS

Below is a list of the most useful tutorial videos for grading online exams using Canvas's SpeedGrader and Grades tools.



Entering Grades

Watch the Video

Grading an assignment in Canvas can be as simple as navigating through cells in an Excel spreadsheet. Detailed information can also be added to a given grade, including Status (Late, Missing, Excused) and grade comments.

Viewing and Sorting Grades

The Gradebook in Canvas can be sorted in many different ways to accommodate the method that suits each instructor best. This can include sorting according to assignment group and module, as well as using Status indicators to see information on late assignments at a glance.

SpeedGrader Advanced Options

Instructors can use the annotation tools in SpeedGrader to mark up student submissions, leave comments, and engage in dialogue with students about the comments. These powerful tools can be used on tablets such as the iPad or a Microsoft Surface.

Re-Grading a Quiz Question

If you enter the wrong answer as correct when setting up a quiz in Canvas, you can re-grade the question after students have already taken the quiz.

Exceptions on Quiz Time and Attempts

Canvas allows instructors to give extra time, and extra quiz attempts, to individual students. The method for doing this is simple but does not use the same set of menus and screens as the normal Edit Quiz function.


